Training Services

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) is designed to help job seekers access employment, education, training, and support services to succeed in the labor market and to match employers with the skilled workers they need to compete in the global economy.

Key components of the Act will enable customers to:

- Easily access the information and services they need through the Illinois workNet[®] system.
- Empower adults to obtain the training in demand occupations they find most appropriate through Individual Training Accounts, which allows adult customers to "purchase" the training they determine best for them.
- Ensure that all State and local programs meet customer expectations.

Dislocated workers are individuals who:

- Have been laid off, or terminated, or have received notice of layoff or termination due to a plant closure or mass layoff,
- Are unemployed through no fault of their own, are eligible for or have exhausted their unemployment compensation and are unlikely to return to their previous occupation or industry,
- Were self-employed (including farmers and ranchers) and are unemployed as a result of general economic conditions in their community, or
- Are displaced homemakers.

How does WIOA help?

WIOA provides for a workforce system that is universally accessible, customer centered, and training that is job-driven to meet the diverse needs of the individual.
