Scenario A

- I understand that everyone will have different ideas.
- I have time management skills.

Scenario B:

Since resources or money may be low because of the dry season, changes may need to take place. As part of the team you need to make sure that you understand the problem at hand, discuss possible solutions, and accept other ideas that are being discussed. When a plan is made and your task is given to you, you should take it and get to work right away. Be reliable. Complete tasks by their due date and communicate if there is going to be delay or if you are having problems. If you are done early, offer your help to other team.
