

ICCB WORKFORCE EDUCATION PLAN

The Workforce Education Plan will:

- Ensure education and economic competitiveness for the system at the local and state levels;
- · Strengthen Business and Industry relationships;
- Maximize employer engagement in the development of relevant programs that will lead to sustainable wages;
- Enhance education and training at all levels of the system including adult education, business and industry, career and technical education, and continuing education; and
- **Provide** integrated options for students to move them quickly into career pathway programs/Programs of Study (POS).

RETAINS AEFLA PURPOSES

Create a partnership among Federal Government, States, and localities to provide adult education and literacy services that

- Assist adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and economic self-sufficiency
- Assist adults who are parents or family members become a full partner in the education development of their children
- Assist adults in completing high school as they are in transition to postsecondary education and employment
- Assist immigrants and other individuals who are English language learners to improve basic skills including speaking and comprehension skills as well as understanding the American system of Government, individual freedom, and responsibilities of citizenship.

WHO CAN RECEIVE ADULT EDUCATION SERVICES UNDER WIOA?

- □ Eligibility to receive Adult Education services include an individual
 - ■Who is 16 years of age
 - □Who is not enrolled in secondary school under state law; and
 - ■Who:
 - ☐ is basic skill deficient;
 - does not have a secondary school diploma or its recognized equivalent; and
 - has not achieved an equivalent level of education; or
 - □ is an English Language Learner.
- 87,000 learners are served annually

WIOA-Title II/Sec. 203

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS UNDER WIOA

- □ Changes Eligible Provider definition WIOA-Title II/Sec. 203
 - ✓Organizations must have demonstrated effectiveness in providing adult education and literacy services
 - √ Broadens eligible provider list to "may include" existing organizations, as well as organizations with employer partnerships
- □ Revises considerations that must be used in awarding grants
 - 13 Considerations WIOA-Title II/Sec. 223
 - · Use of funds for adult education activities
- Alignment of adult education with ESEA (Elementary and Secondary Education Act) State content standards
- □ Requires AEFLA applicants to submit applications to Local Workforce Boards for alignment with local plans
 - □Alignment with local workforce plans and participation in the one-stop system

- ☐ Effective use of technology
- □ Responsiveness to the regional needs as identified in the local plans
- ☐ Serving the most in need population
- □ Past effectiveness in serving providers and improving literacy skills
- ☐ Alignment of activities and services with local plans and services provided in the one-stop center
- □ Use of standards
- ☐ Use of Integrated Education Training

THREE NEW TITLE II ACTIVITIES

■ Integrated education and training

- aims to provide adult education and literacy activities concurrently and contextually with workforce preparation activities and workforce training
- targets training in occupations or clusters that assist adults in their educational and career advancement

■ Workforce preparation activities

- Activities, programs or services to help individuals gain basic academic, critical thinking, digital literacy, and self-management skills
- Includes competencies in utilizing resources and using information, and acquiring other skills necessary for successful transition into postsecondary education, training, or employment

☐ Integrated English Literacy and Civics Education (IEL/CE)

- Codifies the IEL/CE program, previously funded through annual appropriations
- Provides instruction in literacy and English language acquisition, the rights and responsibilities of citizenship and civic participation, and workforce training
- Focuses program design and goals on integrated education and training activities and coordination with local workforce system

STATE LEADERSHIP REQUIRED ACTIVITIES

- Adds *four new required* activities to be supported with funds
 - (1) Alignment of adult education and literacy activities with core programs and one-stop partners to support Unified State plan strategy
 - (2) High quality professional development programs to improve instruction, including essential components of reading instruction and dissemination of models and promising practices
 - (3) Technical assistance to providers based on rigorous research on instructional practices, local one stop responsibilities and effective use of technology
 - (4) Monitoring and evaluation of the quality of adult education activities in the State

WIOA/Title II -Sec. 223

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UNIFIED PLAN:

- □ Unified Strategic Plan
 - Plans include State's strategy to prepare an educated and skilled workforce and meet the needs of employers.
 - States required to prepare a single, coordinated 4-year Unified Plan or Combined State Plan
 - Plans must include the strategic vision and goals of the State and the operational elements to support the strategy
 - Plans will be jointly approved by Secretaries of both Labor and Education
- □ Emphasizes increased accountability and results among the core programs
- ☐ WIOA is authorized until 2020

UNIFIED PLAN AND ADULT EDUCATION

☐ Unified State Plan

- Plan includes AEFLA-specific elements, including:
 - > Participation in the Development of state and local plans
 - Collaboration
 - Local Workforce Board
 - Only one representative for each of the required partners areas on the state and local workforce boards. No representation in multiple categories.
 - Required Partner of the Local One-Stop
 - ➤ Infrastructure Costs
 - ➤ Shared Costs
 - > MOU
 - Accountability Measures
 - ➤ Other items as designated under WIOA Title 1/Sec. 102
