





We remain the most incarcerated country in the world!




A person without data is just another person with an opinion.

The Whole Pie 2022




1 in 3 people behind bars is in a jail. Most have yet to be tried in court.

Over 80% of those in jail under local authority have not been convicted and are presumed innocent. If you include the 111,000 people held in jails that rent out space to other agencies, 67% of all people in jails are unconvicted. Either way, jail incarceration rates are driven largely by local bail practices.

The Whole Pie Illinois



70-100 Million

People in the US with a criminal history.

(It starts with an allegation or charge and may never go away)



113 Million people have an immediate family member who have been incarcerated.

(1/2 of the US adult population)



550 Thousand People Released in 2020

(91% reported food insecurity issuses upon release)


(Recently released individuals are 40X more likely to die from opioid overdose)



Today in our prisons & jails:

71% Men identify as persons of color

54% Women identify as persons of color



There are over **44,000** barriers facing justice involved individuals

(70% of these are related to employment)

Unemployment rate of formerly incarcerated people is higher than peak unemployment during the great depression.

83% of all collateral consequences persist indefinitely



\$60 Billion Spent Each Year

636,000 citizens are released each year (more since COVID19)


More than 2/3 of those released will be rearrested within 3 years and 1/2 will go back to prison

Equipping Individuals for Life Beyond Bars

94% of those behind bars will someday be released, many without the necessary skills to obtain employment

Students who participate in job training behind the walls, score higher in literacy and numeracy

If you take 1 educational class inside the walls you have a 43% better chance of not returning




