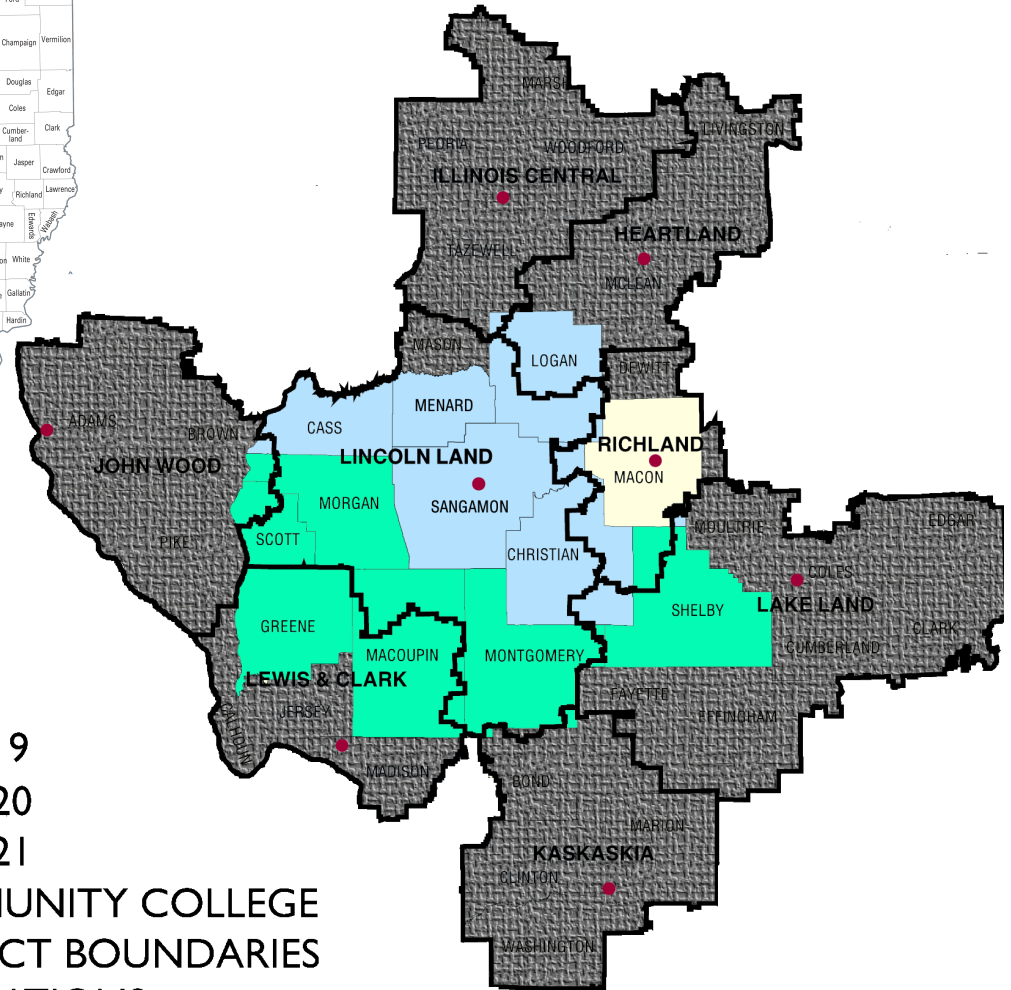
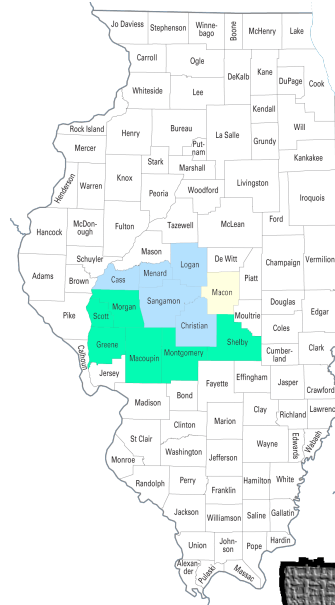

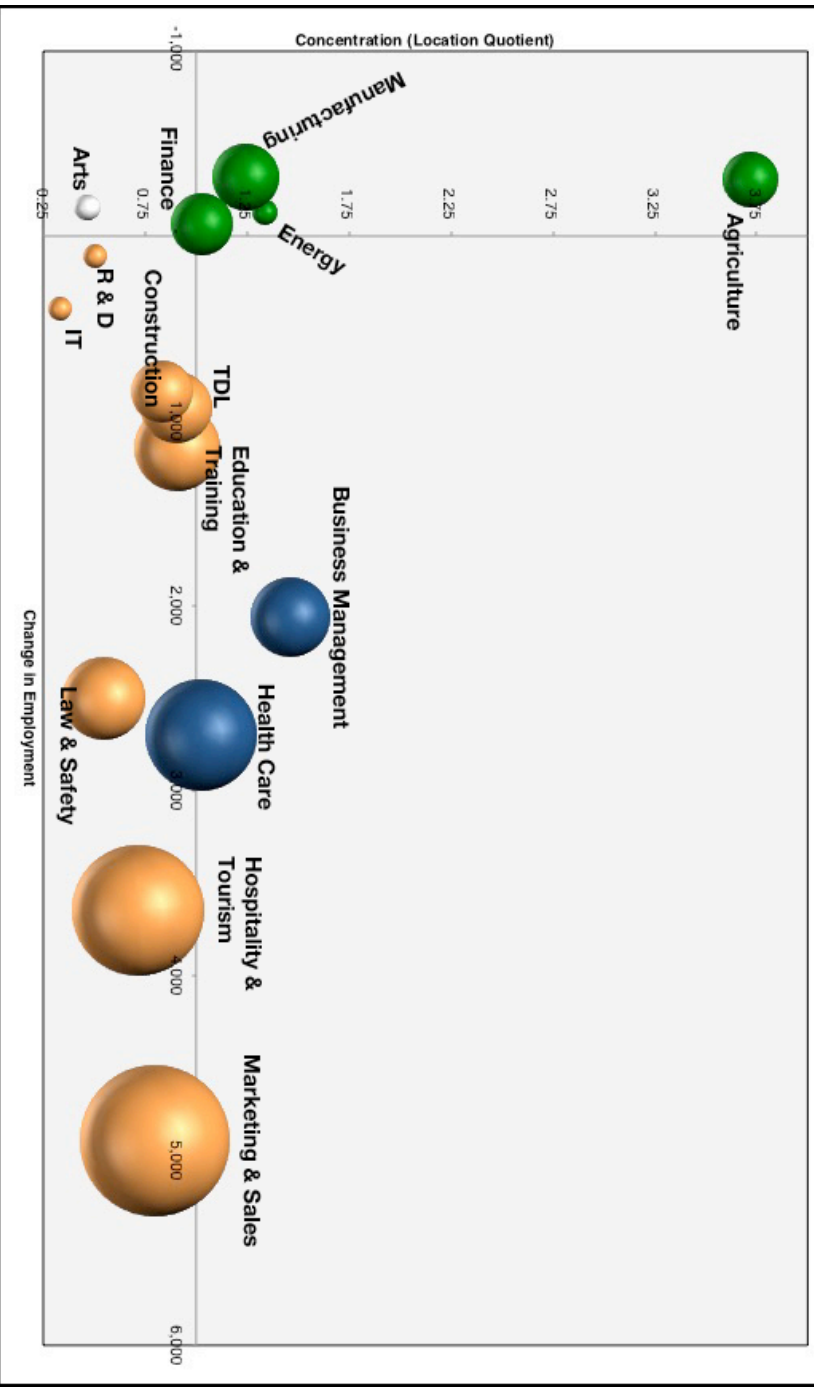

MAJOR INDUSTRY CLUSTERS IN THE CENTRAL REGION



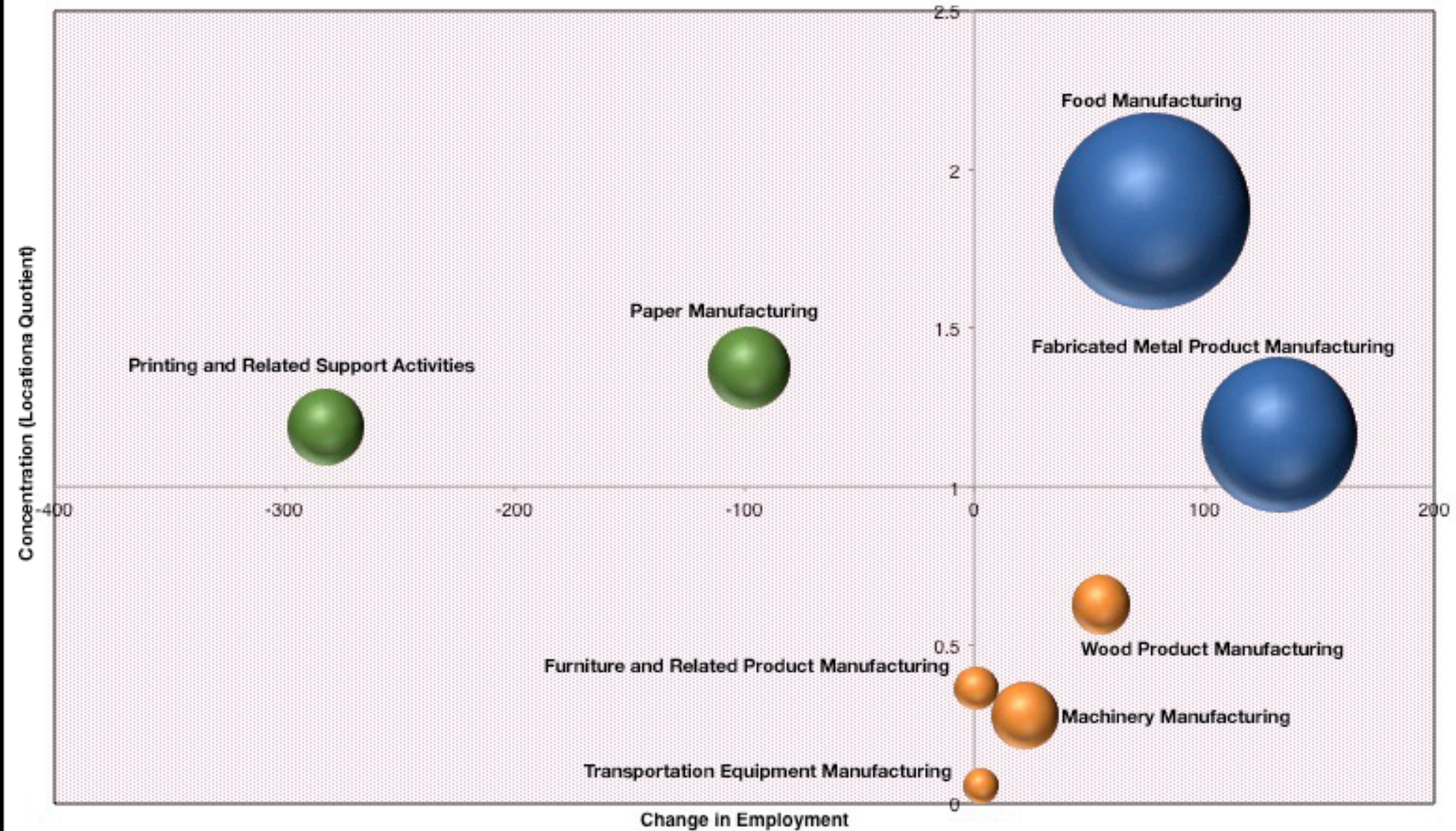
