Dropouts given second chance through ASN

A new understanding of the old adage that not everyone learns the same way is behind the work of Alternative Schools Network (ASN), a membership organization of nearly 50 small schools across Chicago that recently celebrated its 30th year of advocating for educational opportunities for young people who left school but want their diploma or GED.

Rosita Alvarez, who graduated from Institute for Latino Progress' alternative high school last year, is a case in point. Alvarez was the "teacher's pet' at Finkl Academy:

Jack Wuest. First, it ignores the enormous number of youth who have left school without the credentials they need to get work. Second, it obscures the difficulty of reversing a trend that is only likely to grow as the number of young people in this country continues to rise.

Self-reported Reasons for Dropping Out: "Push" & "Fall"

Push & "Falling Out" Factors

Missed too many school days Thought it would be easier to get GED Was getting poor grades/failing school Did not like school Could not keep up with schoolwork Thought could not complete course requirements Could not get along with teachers Did not feel belonged there Could not get along with others Was suspended Changed schools and did not like new one Thought would fail competency test Did not feel safe Was expelled

Small Alternative Schools Best Practices

- Small School Populations (100-425 total students)
- Smaller class sizes (20 students or less)
- Smaller Teacher: Student Ratios (Strong tutoring/academic support options)
- Skilled Teachers- Engage successfully with disconnected youth
- Small programs (100 to 200 students)
- Performance-based goals and outcomes
- Strong, experienced leadership and teaching staff
- Positive peer culture with a family atmosphere of cooperative support
- High standards for student learning
- Small teams of students supported by full-time paid mentors/career coaches
- Comprehensive technology learning center
- Less punitive system for behavioral issues: Peace Rooms

Youth Scholars, Skills, and Services (YS3)

- Keith Thomas, Director
- Serves approximately 215 youth in care (formerly called foster youth) in 15 schools
- Each youth has a mentor, receives tutoring, has the opportunity for paid after school programming (ACE)
- Metrics: Attendance, Enrollment, Graduation, Documentation (case notes, etc)
- Highlights: College tour, graduation luncheon, after school opportunities, possible funding to extend services past graduation

- WIOA funded program serving out of school youth as they re-enroll in school
- 11 member schools host the program
- Work-based Learning (WBL), mentoring, tutoring, and additional services to ensure youth successfully complete high school and transition into postsecondary school or career opportunities
- Home visits, alternative contacts, social media correspondence, and follow-up services 1 year post-exit
