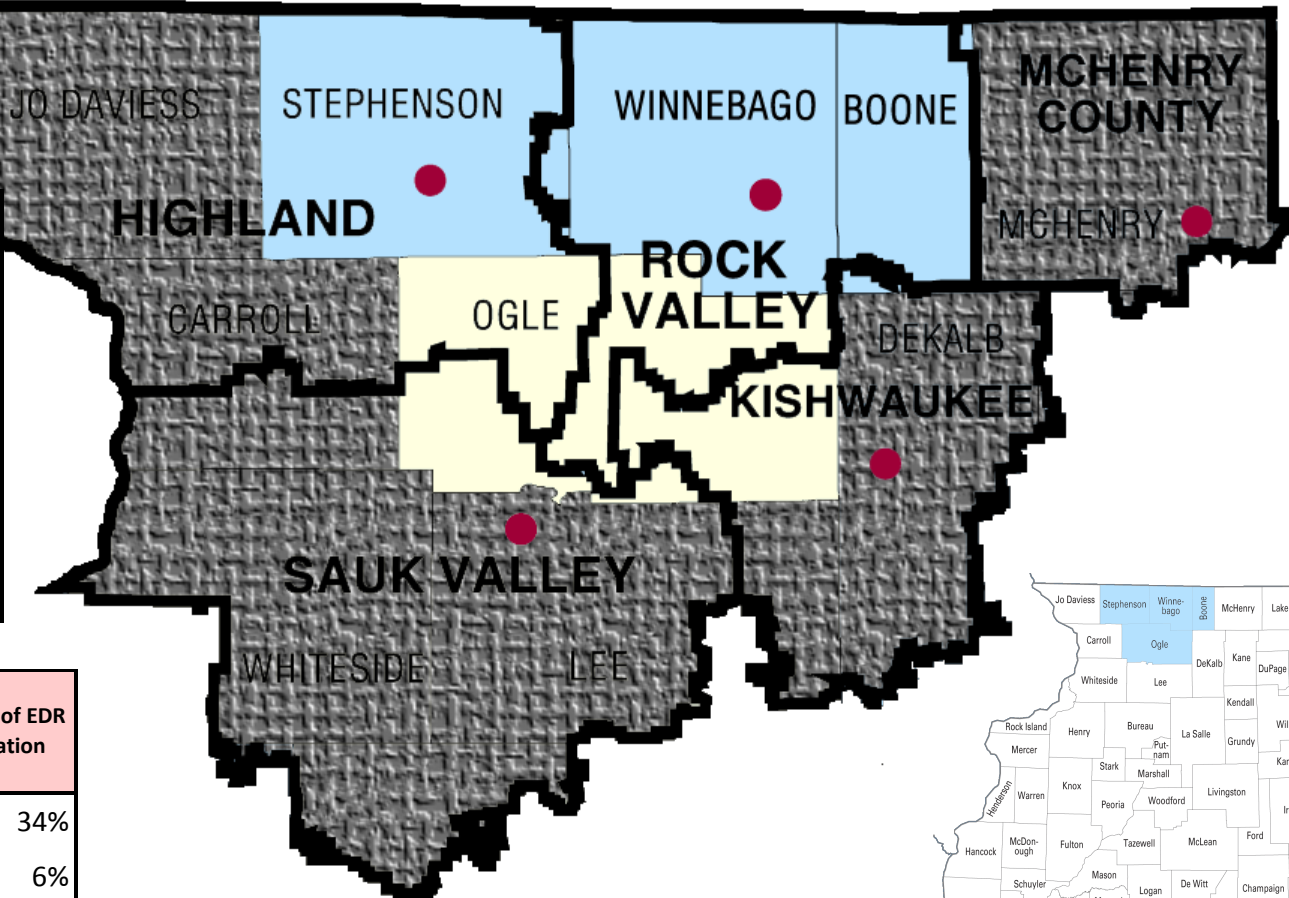

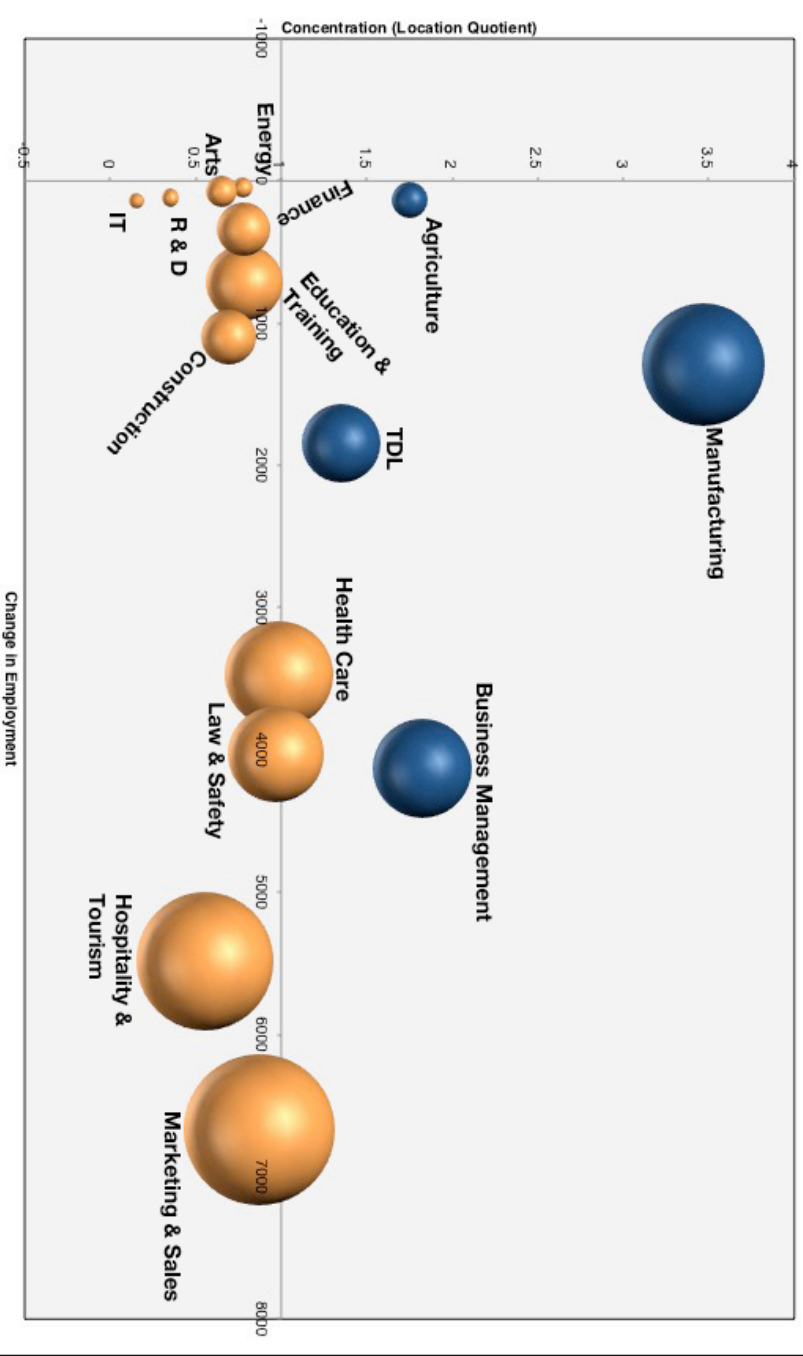

MAJOR INDUSTRY CLUSTERS IN THE NORTHERN STATELINE REGION



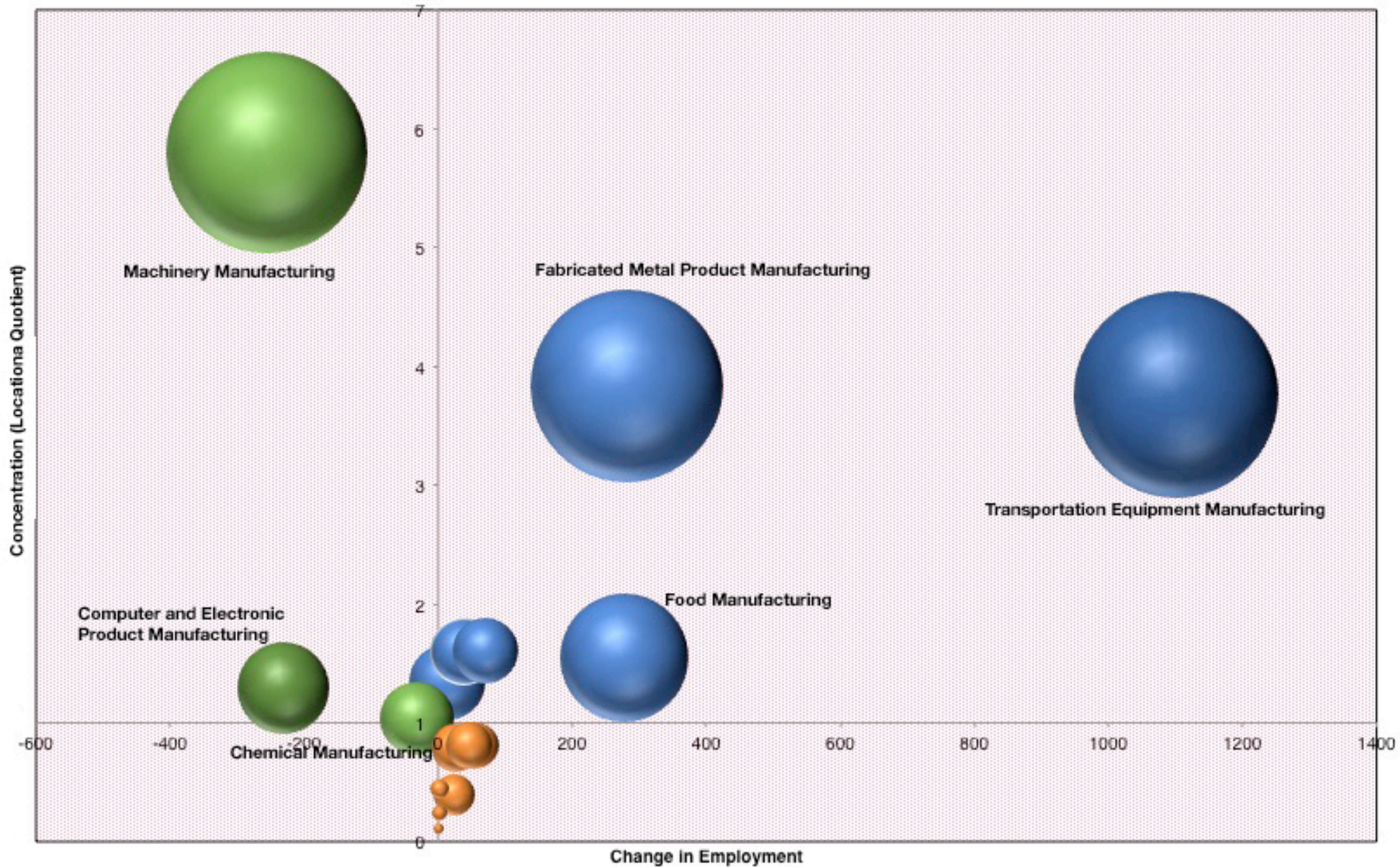
