

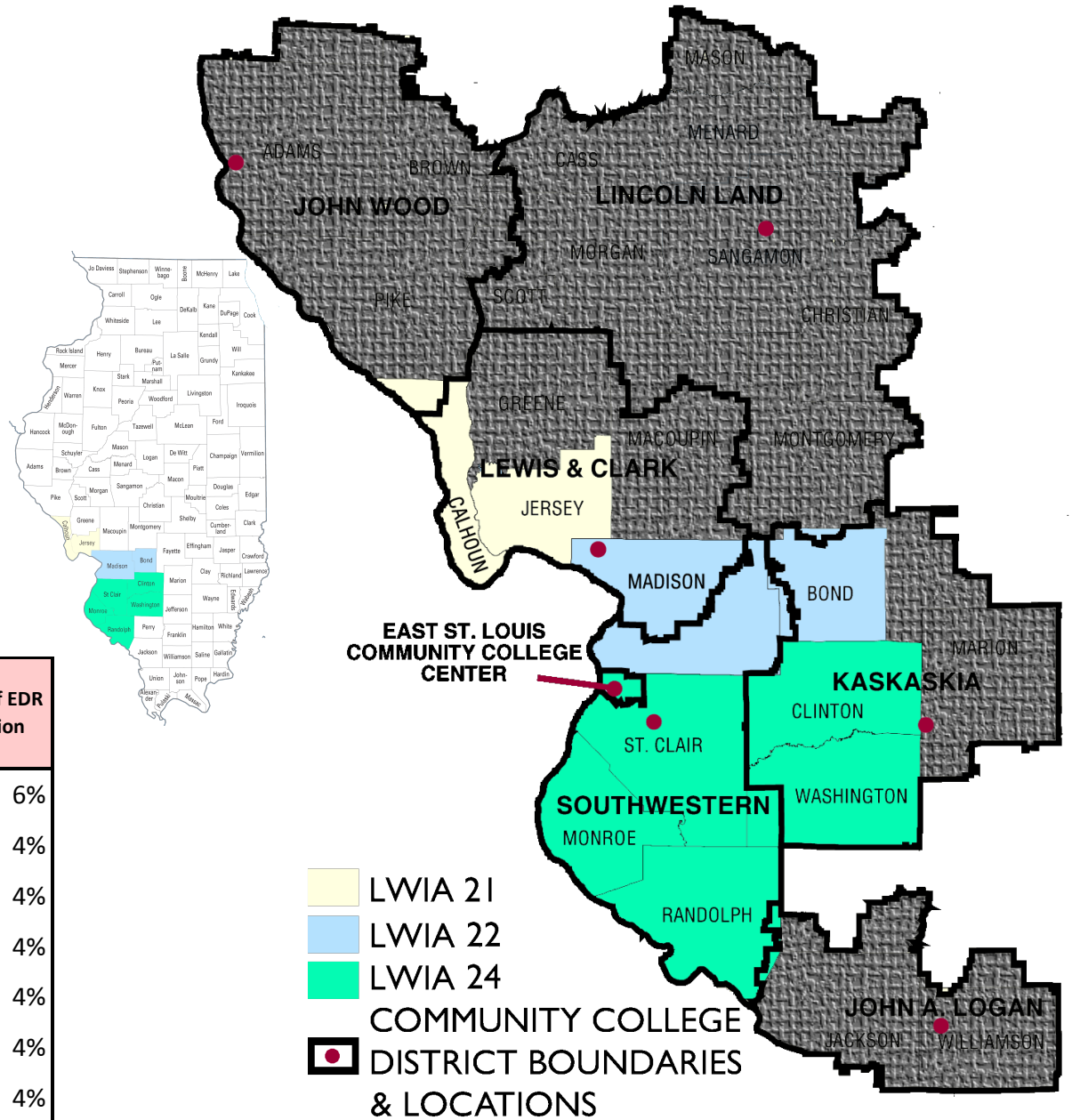

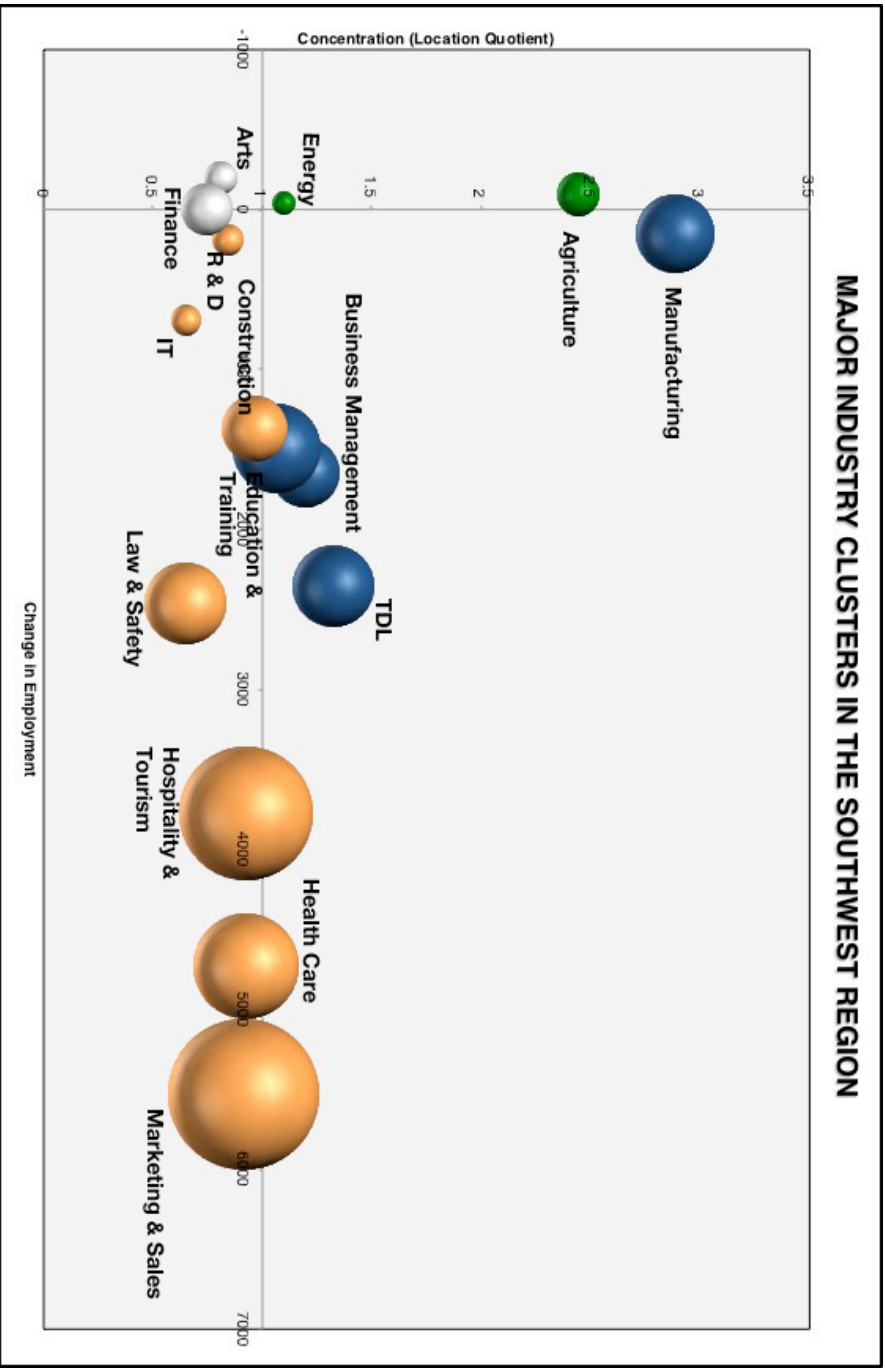

### MAJOR INDUSTRY CLUSTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST REGION



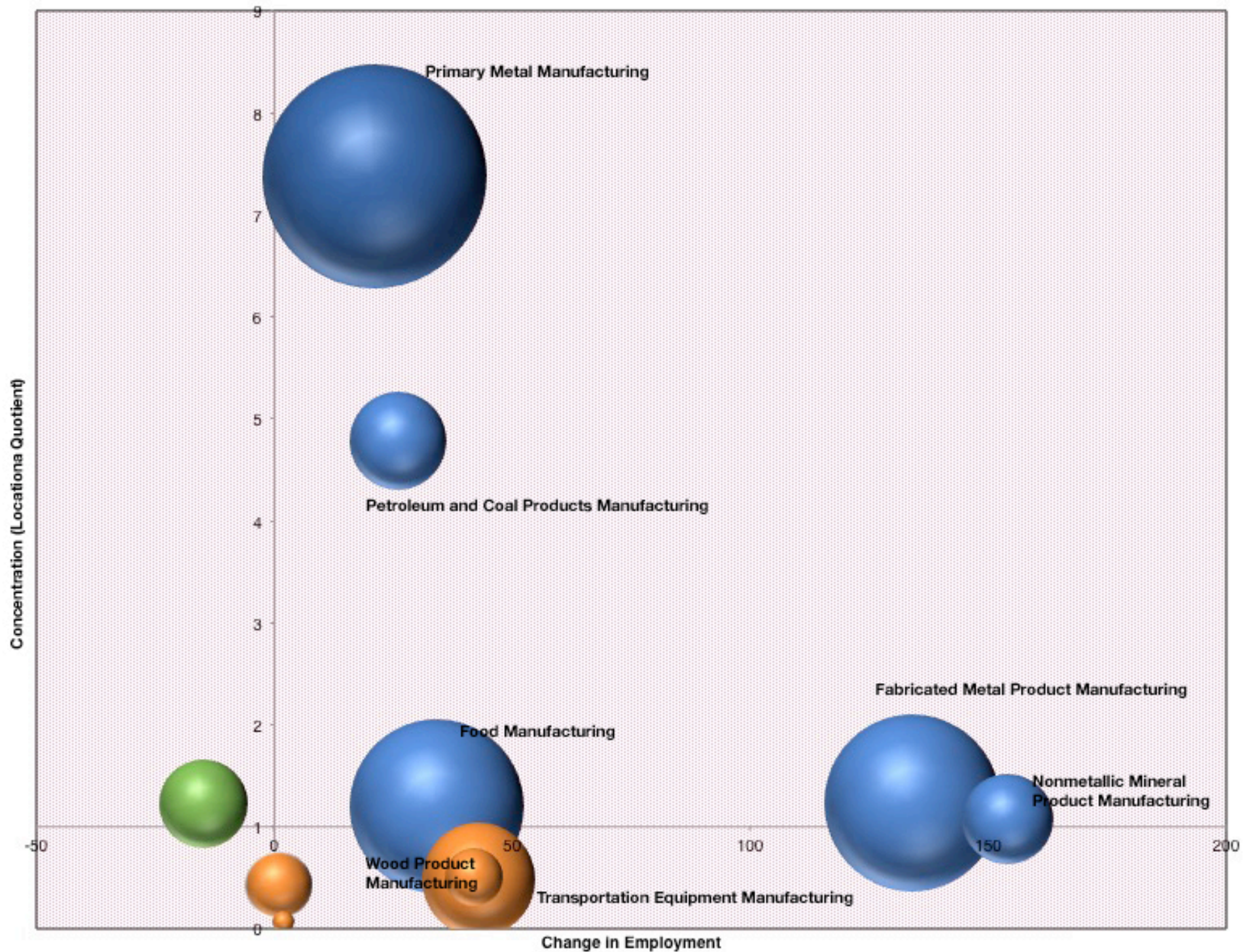
